



# GRANDPARENTS



1. A. How many sets of grandparents do you have?  
B. Where do they live?
2. Have your parents help you understand why and how they are your grandparents.
3. What pet name ( nick name ) do you call your grandparents?
4. Draw and color or take a picture of one or a set of your grandparents.
5. Do a family tree, with the help of your parents, of your family and grandparents.
6. A. Do you and your grandparents do fun things together?  
B. If so, what are some of the things that you do?
7. Do something special with one or a set of your grandparents.
8. Make a scrapbook or a tape recording of stories and things you have heard form you grandparents.

Helps:

2. Example: When the granddaughter answers the phone, she tells her mother, "Here is your daddy on the phone for you." A family connection is what they need to learn.
7. Got to the beach, park, zoo, visit a shut-in, do a craft together, eat dinner, etc.
8. Have them learn the importance of family history.
