Luke Shaefer, an associate professor at the University of Michigan School of Social Work, co-wrote the mesmerizing book *\$2.00 a Day: Living on Almost Nothing in America*. The book chronicles the journey of nearly 1.5 million households in America in extreme poverty. Nearly 3 million children are part of this demographic.
